#### Adopted

"Orphan trains" were a social welfare program that transported over 200,000 orphaned, neglected, and impoverished children from cities like New York to rural areas across the United States between the 1850s and the early 1900s. The children traveled by train, where they were displayed to potential families in what was often a public event, a practice sometimes called "placing out". When arriving in a town, children got off the train, formed a line, and potential families were able to examine them and select the child they desired. Many children were not selected. Some were adopted and then returned if they were not deemed a good fit. Can you imagine?

You and I were in a similar situation. However, our adoption story was much different. God did not line us up to examine us and determine our worthiness. None of us was worthy to stand before our holy God. Yet He, in love, desired us anyway and wanted all men to be saved, but a price had to be paid for our adoption. That price was Jesus. Jesus' perfect life, innocent death, and glorious resurrection secured our future with God for all eternity. We are his own dear children, bought and paid for with the blood of Christ. Galatians 4:4-7 states it clearly, "But when the time had fully come, God sent his Son to be born of a woman, so that he would be born under the law, to redeem those under the law, so that we could be adopted as sons. And because you are sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts to shout, 'Abba, Father!' So you are no longer a slave, but a son. And if you are a son, then you are also an heir of God through Jesus Christ!"

Your Heavenly Father loved you that much! You have been adopted into God's family! Jesus lived, died, and rose for you! Now go and live for Him!
